

Orb Web



These circular webs are spun in between trees and other objects that provide a frame. Webs vary in size - some spiders can create webs up to six feet long! Webs are usually rebuilt daily so the spider can repair any damage, or to move the web to a new location.

Tangle or Cobwebs



Appearing chaotic, these webs don't have a very distinct shape. They work by dropping down silk with tiny globs on it that are so sticky, it traps the spider's prey. Sometimes spiders create webs so close to one another, it can look like one big web!

Sheet Web



Sheet webs are spun horizontally. Some spiders live in between the layers of two sheets of web, and others rest underneath the sheet. Insects that land on the web vibrate the web, and notify the spider to come and get it!

Funnel Web



These spiders create a sheet-like web with a cone-shaped retreat. Fast moving, these spiders seem to launch out of their funnel to quickly grab their prey, and take back into their retreat to eat.
